**Description** Implements a flexible, versatile, and computationally tractable model for density regression based on a single-weights dependent Dirichlet process mixture of normal distributions model for univariate continuous responses. The model assumes an additive structure for the mean of each mixture component and the effects of continuous covariates are captured through smooth nonlinear functions. The key components of our modelling approach are penalised B-splines and their bivariate tensor product extension. The proposed method can also easily deal with parametric effects of categorical covariates, linear effects of continuous covariates, interactions between categorical and/or continuous covariates, varying coefficient terms, and random effects. 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## Description

## Details

Our DDPstar model for the conditional density takes the following form

$$p(y|\mathbf{x}) = \sum_{l=1}^L \omega_l \phi(y | \mu_l(\mathbf{x}), \sigma_l^2),$$

where  $\phi(y|\mu, \sigma^2)$  denotes the density function of the normal distribution, evaluated at  $y$ , with mean  $\mu$  and variance  $\sigma^2$ . The regression function  $\mu_l(\mathbf{x})$  can incorporate both linear and nonlinear (through P-splines) effects of continuous covariates, random effects, categorical covariates (factors) as well as interactions. Interactions between categorical and (nonlinear) continuous covariates are also allowed (factor-by curve interactions).

The mean (regression function) of each mixture component,  $\mu_l(\cdot)$ , is compactly specified (see Rodriguez-Alvarez, Inacio, et al. (2025) for details) as

$$\mu_l(\mathbf{x}) = \underbrace{\mathbf{x}^\top \boldsymbol{\beta}_l}_{\text{Parametric}} + \underbrace{\sum_{r=1}^R \mathbf{z}_r(\mathbf{v}_r)^\top \boldsymbol{\gamma}_{lr}}_{\text{Smooth/Random}}$$

where  $\mathbf{x}^\top \boldsymbol{\beta}_l$  contains all parametric effects, including, by default, the intercept, parametric effects of categorical covariates and linear or parametric effects of continuous covariates and their interactions, as well as, the unpenalised terms associated with the P-splines formulation, and  $\sum_{r=1}^R \mathbf{z}_r(\mathbf{v}_r)^\top \boldsymbol{\gamma}_{lr}$  contains the P-splines' penalised terms, as well as, the random effects.

In our DDPstar model,  $L$  is a pre-specified upper bound on the number of mixture components. The  $\omega_l$ 's result from a truncated version of the stick-breaking construction ( $\omega_1 = \eta_1$ ;  $\omega_l = \eta_l \prod_{r < l} (1 - \eta_r)$ ),  $l = 2, \dots, L$ ;  $\eta_1, \dots, \eta_{L-1} \sim \text{Beta}(1, \alpha)$ ;  $\eta_L = 1$ ). Further, for  $\boldsymbol{\beta}_l$  we consider

$$p(\boldsymbol{\beta}_l | \mathbf{m}, \mathbf{S}) \propto \exp\left(-\frac{1}{2} (\boldsymbol{\beta}_l - \mathbf{m})^\top \mathbf{S}^{-1} (\boldsymbol{\beta}_l - \mathbf{m})\right),$$

with conjugate hyperpriors  $\mathbf{m} \sim N_Q(\mathbf{m}_0, \mathbf{S}_0)$  and  $\mathbf{S}^{-1} \sim W_Q(\nu, (\nu\Psi)^{-1})$ , where  $W(\nu, (\nu\Psi)^{-1})$  denotes a Wishart distribution with  $\nu$  degrees of freedom and expectation  $\Psi^{-1}$ , and  $Q$  denotes the length of vector  $\boldsymbol{\beta}_l$ . Regarding the prior distributions for the P-splines' penalised coefficients and random effect coefficients we have

$$p(\boldsymbol{\gamma}_{lr} | \tau_{lr}^2) \propto \exp\left(-\frac{1}{2\tau_{lr}^2} \boldsymbol{\gamma}_{lr}^\top \mathbf{K}_r \boldsymbol{\gamma}_{lr}\right),$$

where the specific forms of  $\mathbf{K}_r$  depend on the components type (see Rodriguez-Alvarez, Inacio, et al. (2025) for details). Finally,  $\sigma_l^{-2} \sim \Gamma(a_{\sigma^2}, b_{\sigma^2})$ ,  $\tau_{lr}^{-2} \sim \Gamma(a_{\tau^2}, b_{\tau^2})$  and  $\alpha \sim \Gamma(a_\alpha, b_\alpha)$ , where

$\Gamma(a, b)$  denotes a Gamma distribution with shape parameter  $a$  and rate parameter  $b$ . For a detailed description, we refer to Rodriguez-Alvarez, Inacio, et al. (2025).

It is worth referring that with respect to the computation of the DIC, when  $L = 1$ , it is computed as in Spiegelhalter et al. (2002), and when  $L > 1$ , DIC3 as described in Celeux et al. (2006) is computed. Also, for the computation of the conditional predictive ordinates (CPO) we follow the stable version proposed by Gelman et al. (2014).

An object of class `DDPstar`. It is a list containing the following objects:

## Note

The input argument `formula` is similar to that used for the `glm` function, except that flexible specifications can be added by means of function `f`. For instance, specification  $y \sim x_1 + f(x_2)$  would assume a linear effect of  $x_1$  (if  $x_1$  is continuous) and the effect of  $x_2$  (assumed continuous) would be modeled using Bayesian P-splines. Categorical variables (factors) can be also incorporated, as well as random effects (see [rae](#)) and interaction terms. For example, to include the factor-by-curve interaction between  $x_4$  (continuous covariate) and  $x_3$  (categorical covariate) we need to specify  $y \sim x_3 + f(x_4, by = x_3)$ .

---

**Description**

Auxiliary function used to define smooth terms using Bayesian P-splines within DDPstar model formulae. The function does not evaluate the smooth - it exists purely to help set up a model using P-spline based smoothers.

| atau | a numeric value. Hyperparameter; shape parameter of the gamma prior distribution for the precisions (inverse variances) of the smooth term. The default is 1.  |
| btau | a numeric value. Hyperparameter; rate parameter of the gamma prior distribution for the precisions (inverse variances) of the smooth term. The default is 0.005.   |



`prior.2D` character string. Indicates whether the same precision parameter should be used for both variables in two-dimensional smooth functions (isotropy), or if each variable should have a different precision parameter (anisotropy). In the latter case, the Bayesian extension of the PS-ANOVA model by Lee et al. (2013) is used. The default is "anisotropic".

### Details

The functions `f()` is designed to represent either one dimensional smooth functions for main effects of continuous explanatory variables or two dimensional smooth functions representing two way interactions of continuous variables using Bayesian P-splines. By default, the values of the arguments `nseg`, `pord` and `bdeg` are repeated to the length of the explanatory covariates. The two dimensional smooth terms are constructed using the tensor-product of marginal (one-dimensional) B-spline bases (Eilers and Marx, 2003). In this case, the Bayesian extension of the PS-ANOVA model by Lee et al. (2013) is considered when `prior.2D = "anisotropic"`. It is also possible to include factor-by-curve interactions between a continuous covariate (e.g., `x1`) and a categorical covariate (e.g., `x2`) by means of argument `by`:  $y \sim x2 + f(x1, by = x2)$ .

### Value

The function is interpreted in the formula of a DDPstar model and creates the right framework for fitting the smoother. List containing (among others) the following elements:
